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Professor Judges has taught courses in Constitutional Law, Law and Mental Health Systems, Criminal Procedure, Professional Responsibility, Civil Rights, Jurisprudence, Evidence, and Torts. His published works include the social psychology of capital punishment, eyewitness evidence, the relationship between the psychology of risk preference and tort law, first amendment issues, the relationship between the affirmative action debate and disadvantaged neighborhoods, and abortion rights.

Professor Judges graduated with highest honors from the University of Maryland School of Law in 1983, where he was editor-in-chief of the Maryland Law Review. He received his doctorate in Clinical Psychology from the University of Tulsa in 1999. Following graduation from law school, Professor Judges clerked for Judge Alvin B. Rubin on the United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit. He then practiced law with Arnold & Porter before joining the faculty of the University of Arkansas School of Law in 1989. Professor Judges serves as Reporter to the Arkansas Supreme Court Committee on Jury Instructions (Civil).
